While undergoing a year of chemo and radiation I was still able to sit up and sew on good days, although at a reduced pace. Cancer is taxing; often during treatment and doctors' visits, we don't have a lot left over for ourselves, let alone meet other's needs. I thought to myself that I could help others with this new hobby. This crazy idea resulted in my first HCRC donation of \$1500. People were generous to help support the HCRC classes and programs!

In March 2022, I once again had to get off the cancer recuperation couch. I went outdoors for fresh air and slowly began to plant a flower Breast Cancer Victory

Garden. I was healing and getting happier by once again focusing on something positive. In May, as radiation treatment ended, I suddenly had a bushel of flowers! To date, my little garden has produced over 100 vases of flowers that lift and encourage women in treatment.

Everyone needs to feel loved and more so for cancer patients. Helping others along my own healing journey and spending time gardening, teaching, and craft knitting has been a life saver for me. I've since returned to my passion of teaching interactive Spanish online, *Learn Spanish Fast Hoy*. My life is full again and I'm grateful for insurance, the care of great local doctors and VIDA! # Igniting Hope Through 17 Strong Victory Trips

Victory Trips are vacations or experiences designed to celebrate victory over disease with a loved one, fulfill a life long dream, and begin a new chapter.

Compassion overflows when your loved one is diagnosed with a life threatening cancer. Holly Teixeira, President of 17 Strong and caregiver to her son Ryan Teixeira, recalls when her son was diagnosed with cancer, "It rocks your world when you know that your kid is battling for their life. Watching your child go through nine months of really heavy

treatment is tough." The experience of being a caregiver to their child with cancer opened up the idea to help others in the cancer community receive a trip of their dreams once they finish treatment, something their son was unable to do.

The idea for 17 Strong was conceived when Ryan was offered a trip, that was later rescinded, due to aging out of the sponsoring program. Ryan loved to give back to others and he wanted to be able to give a trip to anybody else who had faced cancer treatment. Though he fought hard, Ryan passed away in spring of 2017 and thus his parents began their journey of creating the 17 Strong dream in his honor.

Holly recalls a favorite memory of Ryan while caring for him in the hospital, "Ryan was given a medication for the first time and he was in the hallway with his IV bag and IV poll doing the 'whip & nae nae' dance with the nurses. He used to say he

didn't remember doing that and we used to tell him that we remembered, because it was hilarious." Although their time as caregivers was cut short, Ryan created the framework of 17 Strong to provide victory celebration trips over the severities of fighting lifealtering sickness, so his parents could continue the journey.

Leading 17 Strong has allowed Steve and Holly to be personally involved with the lives of each potential recipient, encouraging each candidate as they spread the message of renewed hope through 17 Strong Victory Trips. Each recipient becomes a part of a growing 17 Strong family as Steve and Holly lovingly carry on the gift of their son's legacy.

# Simple things we can do to support our emotional wellness during the holidays:

- Take breaks to focus on your breath and surroundings throughout the day and ensure your physiological needs are met!
- Get outside every day and connect with nature even if just for a few minutes to feel the sunshine on your face and breathe fresh air.
- Do something every day that brings you joy, even if it's simple!
- Set boundaries with people who can be draining and keep work at work if possible, keeping your personal time sacred.
- Protect your energy: acknowledge your stresses and challenges, but redirect
  when not serving you and utilize healthy outlets to help you cope with stress and
  challenge.

The holidays are right around the corner, so here's a recipe to help add some cheer!

## **Creamy Rye and Butternut Squash Soup**

Total Time: 1 hour and 5 minutes • Serves 6: 11/3 cups each

1½ pounds butternut, Kabocha or Hubbard squash

2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

2 cloves garlic, minced 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper

6 cups water

1 teaspoon kosher or sea salt

5 cups 1-inch pieces crustless stale rye bread (see Tip)

2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh parsley

**Great for those who are:** 

- Experiencing sore mouth, sore throat or diarrhea
- Dairy free
- Vegetarian/vegan
- 1. Peel and seed squash. Cut into enough 1-inch pieces to make about 4½ cups.
- 2. Heat oil in a large saucepan or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add garlic and crushed red pepper; cook, stirring, until fragrant, about 1 minute. Add the squash and stir to coat with the oil. Add water and salt. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, partially covered, until the squash is tender, 15 to 20 minutes.
- 3. Mash about half the squash against the side of the pot to create a thick broth. Stir in bread; return to a simmer and cook, stirring occasionally, until the bread is beginning to break apart, 5 to 15 minutes (cooking time depends on how stale and/or dense your bread is).
- 4. Remove the soup from the heat, cover and let stand for 15 minutes. Stir in parsley and serve.

TIP: To stale bread naturally, store at room temperature in a paper (not plastic) bag for 2 to 5 days or bake cubed bread on a large baking sheet at 250°F until crisped and dry, 15 to 20 minutes.

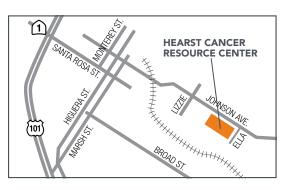
