"The Art of Misfortune" ... A Survivor's Story

As told by Jake Rodrigues

For years, Mom would tell me, "You need to get that checked out." It was in my early 30's, I was naïve and



unafraid of much of anything, let alone cancer. However, buried within my right sideburn was the teeniest mole that one day would change my life forever. At 34, I finally got it checked out and the biopsy came back "Melanoma." I received my handy pamphlet, set a future

appointment for removal and "no big deal," it seemed.

Two years later, at 36, I had a grand maul seizure. There were no warning signs, for all I knew I was a healthy guy who had a random stroke. Just 48 hours after admission and numerous tests, scans, biopsies and labs, my wife, mother and I were told in my hospital room that I had "Stage IV Malignant Melanoma" with three tumors in the brain and one the size of an apricot in my lung. We were speechless, and at that moment the world just went black.

We needed a team—fast. Within one week, countless calls and chasing referrals from my Oncologist and others on

my team, I felt confident that together we would beat this disease.

I had Gamma Knife Radiosurgery, immunotherapy infusions, lymph node extraction, brain surgery and dozens of tests and scans. I changed my diet, sought out holistic treatments for anxiety, rest, lots of prayer and meditation. Finally, in May 2019, I received confirmation that I exhibited No Evidence of Disease (NED). This May for skin cancer awareness month I will be four years NED!

It's been a long, and difficult road (for many) to get here. Cancer does not discriminate; it reveals your truest family, friends, and supporters, and it rallies communities while it also shakes families to their core. The lessons learned, the gratitude for every new day, the survivors I have met along the way and the friends I have lost and will never forget. Because of this, I feel there is an ironic beauty in all this misfortune, telling us we will not let cancer win over our spirits and determination. The #1 rule when you are battling cancer is to advocate for yourself, always!

I hope my story gives hope to many who feel scared, as I was. Nobody said the battle would be easy, but I can tell you it certainly was worth it. When in doubt, get it checked out: it very well could save your life.

Protect Yourself From the Sun

Practice Safe Sun!

Sun exposure is the most preventable risk factor for all skin cancers, including melanoma. You can have fun in the sun and decrease your risk of skin cancer. Here's how to protect yourself from the sun:



Seek shade. The sun's rays are strongest between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. If your shadow is shorter than you are, seek shade.



Wear sun-protective clothing, such as a lightweight, long-sleeved shirt, pants, a wide-brimmed hat, and sunglasses with UV protection, when possible. For more effective protection, choose clothing with an ultraviolet protection factor (UPF) number on the label.



Apply a broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher to all skin not covered by clothing. Broad-spectrum sunscreen provides protection from both ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) rays. Reapply every two hours, even on cloudy days, and after swimming or sweating.



Use extra caution near water, snow, and sand, as they reflect and intensify the damaging rays of the sun, which can increase your chance of skin cancer.



Avoid tanning beds. If you want to look tan, consider using a self-tanning product, but continue to use sun protection outdoors.

If you find any new or suspicious spots on your skin, or any spots that are changing, itching, or bleeding, make an appointment to see a board-certified dermatologist.

Ask the Registrar

What is your main role as the Cancer Registrar?

"My role at French Hospital and the HCRC is multi-faceted. I help maintain accreditation through the Commission on Cancer. I also make sure that French Hospital and HCRC are in compliance with state requirements for data reporting for cancer cases in our community."


