Our Cancer Journey as a Family and as a Community

"Honey, how did the mammogram go?" I asked. "Well, they did not find anything, but I still feel something. I think I need to have this looked at more deeply," she replied. Thus, the realization that not all tests are accurate and I am thankful that my beautiful bride of 26 years continued to advocate for herself until they found the tumor. In April 2022, the floor fell out from under us after her surgery and we found out the cancer had spread more than they originally thought. She now had to go through chemotherapy, radiation, and a drug regimen.

With the above description, one would think the story of our journey was going to be more about the actual medical treatment, but that is not my intent. Our experience was that the medical science and treatment process is well known and continues to advance. With all the medical data and testing, they knew how not only to medically treat her but also to minimize the possibility of it coming back. What I found in my research is that often the medical treatment was the focus and forgot about the other aspects of recovery. These are the sometimes-subtle other elements of healing like diet, exercise, and—maybe most importantly having a support network.

Having a support network does not have to be complicated. It can be anything that takes your mind off what you



are going through whether that is family, friends, or the healing therapies that Hearst Cancer Resource Center provides. I cannot stress enough the importance of this in the recovery process. This is the mental aspect of recuperation: "Your mind has to want to and be brave enough to get better."

So, what could I do to bring more visibility to this? I know: I'll grow my hair and have it shaved off to make a wig for a cancer patient. It started that simply; then more people got involved and wanted to turn it into something that could monetarily benefit HCRC. Thus, was born the event to raise money around shaving my head. I could claim to have a fair number of follicley-challenged friends and they fantasized about seeing me bald; but more than that the community came together. And in an interesting twist, our 19-year-old son (our youngest), jumped in and said, "If you're doing this Dad, I am doing this with you."

Breast Cancer: When to Consider a Genetics Evaluation

Have you heard someone talk about being tested for "the BRCA genes"? What are they? What about other cancer related genes? When should you care about them?

Our bodies consist of cells that contain DNA (our genetic instructions). Genes are the words in our DNA that control the growth and function of our cells. We have two copies of every gene, one from each parent. Certain genes related to cancer regulate cell growth (increasing or decreasing how quickly cells divide) and others spell check and fix our DNA. When these genes aren't working normally, cancer can develop.

As we age, changes (mutations) are acquired in genes related to cancer, making them unable to do their job. These changes occur from exposures, the way we live, age, or by chance. These are called somatic variants and are not inherited. Oncologists typically test cancer cells to see what genetic mutations are present so targeted genetic therapies can be used.

In hereditary cancers, one or both copies of someone's cancer genes doesn't work properly at conception, long before they develop cancer. They are therefore at increased risk for cancer at a young age. These are called germline variants and can be inherited or new in a person. The BRCA1 and BRCA2 genes are the most common example of genes that when altered from birth, increase someone's risk for breast cancer. Other genes include ATM, CHEK2, and PALB2 along with many other more rare genes.

Certain factors in someone's personal or family history may indicate an increased risk of hereditary breast cancer. These factors include:

- A family history of breast or ovarian cancer, especially among close relatives like parents, siblings, or children
- A personal history of breast cancer before the age of 50, breast cancer in both breasts, or triple negative breast cancer
- Personal or family history of certain cancers like ovarian, pancreatic, or male breast cancer
- Ashkenazi Jewish ancestry

Identifying hereditary cancer can guide personalized screening, prevention, and treatment strategies. If you meet any of these criteria, consider seeking a cancer genetics evaluation. Genetic counseling involves evaluating personal and family medical history, providing education about genetic conditions and inheritance patterns, and offering emotional support and guidance to make informed decisions about genetic testing and its implications. We are thrilled to be offering these services on the Central Coast through our UCLA Health office in SLO.

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
