I am surviving cancer

I'm not exactly a long-term survivor, yet. But I continue to survive.

In August 2013, at 66 years of age, I was diagnosed with breast cancer. I was stunned. My surgery was scheduled for October 28, my sister's birthday. I decided that was a good omen. Chemotherapy followed surgery in December 2013.

No one can prepare you for chemotherapy. Three days after the first infusion, I began to experience aches and pains, constipation, headaches, nausea and fatigue. More side effects followed. Six infusion treatments were planned, but after the fourth I was so weak the oncologist decided that was enough.

I then began eight weeks of radiation therapy, which also left me constantly fatigued.

How have I coped with this ordeal and promoted my survival? Well, my cancer was caught early because I didn't ignore symptoms. I take recommended tests, take care of myself and work hard to communicate with my doctors.

Most importantly, I have an incredible support network. The love and care of my husband, my sister and my friends buoyed my spirit. Gloria Caine, the Nurse Navigator at the Hearst Cancer Resource Center (HCRC), provided invaluable educational material, resources and emotional support. The counsel of my oncologist, Dr. Brian DiCarlo, made me optimistic about my long-term survival even in the depths of chemotherapy.

Is this the end of cancer for me? As Dr. DiCarlo says, "You live long enough, you're going to get something." Something will get me but I'll be loving, laughing and doing my best to survive.

Skin Cancer: Prevention and Early Detection

Skin Cancer is an abnormal growth of skin cells that primarily develops on areas of the skin exposed to the sun's rays. Every year, more than two million Americans are diagnosed with skin cancer, making it the most common form of cancer.



The following are the most common types of skin cancer:

Basal Cell Carcinoma

- · Can be removed by freezing or surgery if found early.
- Is the least life-threatening and with proper treatment, can be completely eliminated.

Squamous Cell Carcinoma

- · Can also be removed by freezing or surgery if found early.
- · Is dangerous, but in most cases it is not life-threatening if treated early.

Malignant Melanoma

- Is the deadliest form of skin cancer because it has the potential, if not caught early, to spread into the lymph nodes.
- Frequently develops in a mole or suddenly appears as a new dark spot on the skin.
- Early diagnosis and treatment are crucial.

Individuals are at high risk if they:

- Have a past or family history of skin cancer, especially melanoma.
- · Have irregular, large, or many moles.
- Are fair-skinned.
- · Have a history of sunburns.
- · Have had chemical and/or radiation exposure.

Follow these tips to decrease your likelihood of skin cancer:

- · Stay in the shade, especially during midday hours.
- · Wear clothing that covers your arms and legs.
- · Wear wide-brimmed hats to shade your face, neck and ears.
- · Wear sunglasses that block both UVA and UVB rays.
- · Use sunscreen with SPF 30 or higher and apply daily.
- · Avoid indoor tanning beds or lamps.
- · Speak to your doctor if you notice any changes to your skin.

Remember, nearly all skin cancer can be prevented by limiting unprotected sun exposure. If detected early, skin cancer can be treated successfully.

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Announcing Free Mammogram Screening Clinic Hours

Breast cancer is the most common cancer for women. However, in recent years the death rate from breast cancer has steadily gone down because of a variety of factors, including early detection.

To support individuals who are uninsured, French Hospital Medical Center (FHMC) in collaboration with SLO Public Health (Paso Robles), Noor Clinic, The Center and Planned Parenthood are pleased to announce the Women's Imaging Center will now have evening hours for free screening mammograms only.

Free screening hours are 4:00 PM to 7:00 PM on April 19, June 21, August 16 and November 15.

In order to receive a free screening mammogram, individuals must first visit one of our collaborators and get a referral from a clinical breast exam.

Weekend clinics are still available on May 6, May 20, October 7 and October 21 from 11:00 AM to 4:30 PM.
