Breast Cancer Targeted Therapy

Targeted therapy is, in theory, the ideal method of treating cancer. A targeted therapy is one that takes advantage of a unique feature of a malignant cell and kills the cancer by targeting its "Achilles heel." A targeted therapy can be a "silver bullet" that leaves normal cells untouched and therefore has less toxicity. Breast cancer was one of the first malignancies to take advantage of targeted therapies when tamoxifen was developed in 1962. This drug, which blocks estrogen receptors, is still used to this day. Trastuzumab came on line in 1998 and is a drug that targets the Her-2-neu receptor. Targeted therapies were then developed that target the VEGF receptor and the mTOR pathway. More recently, drugs have been developed that target CDK4/6, PARP and the PIK3CA mutation. These targeted therapies are changing the way we are treating breast cancer resulting in longer survival with fewer toxicities.

Understanding Ovarian Cancer

Ovarian cancer affects approximately 23,000 women per year in the United States. Nearly 15,000 women die annually each year from this disease. Most women diagnosed with ovarian cancer are over the age of 50. Presently, there appears to be no effective screening program for ovarian cancer. The early symptoms are often vague abdominal and pelvic discomfort, bloating, a

sense of fullness and urinary frequency. Unfortunately, most cases present at an advanced stage, making it a very difficult disease to cure.

In spite of these facts, the mortality rate for ovarian cancer in the US has fallen by 33% over the past 40 years. This has been due to serious advances in the surgical, medical and supportive care of women with ovarian cancer. It is now clear that many cases of ovarian cancer likely emanate from the nearby fallopian tubes. Removing the fallopian tubes as a prevention strategy is now a standard choice for women.

It appears that nearly 20% of ovarian cancer cases are familial, or genetic, in nature. All women in the US diagnosed with ovarian cancer should be offered genetic testing to detect different cancer causing mutations.

Prevention strategies such as prophylactic removal of the ovaries and fallopian tubes are used to reduce ovarian cancer risk in affected families.

Cancer medicine has undergone a rapid revolution. Patients with cancer are now often treated with different targeted therapies. These novel drugs exploit particular biological or molecular targets in cancer cells. They work quite differently from conventional chemotherapy and in many studies have shown significant advantages.

Recently, a large study revealed that women with one particular familial form of ovarian cancer had significant improvement in survival when treated by a novel class of drugs called PARP inhibitors. Furthermore, studies of immunotherapy agents and vaccines (medical strategies that harness the immune system to treat cancer) are underway in ovarian cancer.

Women affected by ovarian cancer have a much better prognosis when their care is managed by a gynecologic oncologist. These are expert gynecologists with advanced certification in the comprehensive care of women affected by gynecologic cancer. Most importantly, gynecologic oncology programs and practices are unique in the world of oncology in that they offer "one stop" comprehensive care for women and families affected by ovarian cancer.

Ovarian cancer continues to represent a significant challenge. Today, there is ample reason for hope as we continue to improve our understanding of ovarian cancer and improve the lives of the people we serve who are affected by it.

Take Charge of your Health and Wellbeing with Lifestyle Modifications!

Current studies suggest that lifestyle modifications play an increasingly larger role in the fight against breast cancer. Although we can't change age, family history, or ethnic background (nonmodifiable changes) we *can* modify and control our lifestyle choices! A wonderful benefit of a healthy lifestyle is an enhanced sense of wellbeing, so you feel and perform better in your day to day activities. The following aspects of lifestyle modifications may help you in your fight against breast cancer:

Maintain a healthy weight – an emphasis on overall body composition (losing body fat and gaining muscle) for optimum fitness. Work with your oncologist to help determine what your goal body weight should be.

Physical Activity – implement a daily exercise routine (such as walking) and build up your endurance. Aim for at least 30 minutes of moderately paced physical activity five days a week. Strength training with light weights can be added to retain muscle mass.

Balanced Diet - A combination of fresh, nutritional foods such as vegetables, fruits, whole grains, fish, and healthy fats is optimal. Avoid fast foods, refined sugars, and processed meats.

Alcoholic Beverages – Drinking alcohol increases the risk of several types of cancer. The amount of alcohol you drink matters, and the more you drink, the higher the risk. Limit yourself to one drink a day.

As always, it is important to consult with your oncologist and/or nutritionist before making dietary or physical activity changes to your lifestyle.

Skin Cancer Mindfulness

Joshua J. Marine said, "Challenges are what makes life interesting and overcoming them is what makes life meaningful." You can live a fulfilling life, no matter what comes next. You have overcome challenges, be it cancer or not, you have the right frame of mind and you know how to figure out the best action plan.

If not identified at an early stage, melanoma has a high rate of morbidity and mortality. The mainstay of surgical intervention and the newest immunotherapeutic innovations in oncology are improving the fight. Nonetheless, the easiest way to live a life free of malignant melanoma is to never have it. The next best scenario is to catch it at its infancy. In many cases, each and every one of us has the power to make that happen.

Skin cancer mindfulness begins with knowing your risk factors and how to avoid them. The most important example of avoiding a risk factor is protection from ultraviolet (UV) light. The problem with sun prevention is that we live in San Luis Obispo County and we love being outside!

For this reason and others, San Luis Obispo County is a hot spot for melanoma, even compared to the rest of California. According to the California Cancer Registry, the average rate of invasive melanoma in San Luis Obispo County is almost twice as high as the rest of the state, and in Santa Barbara County one and a half times as high.

The good news is my colleagues and I are here to help. Over the past ten years, I have reviewed and diagnosed more than 100,000 skin slides, helping your treating physician give you the truest course towards peace of mind. In the next ten years my vision involves launching a skin cancer mindfulness initiative that includes a plan of education, prevention and mindfulness that aims to decrease melanoma statistics in our community while still enjoying the amazing place we live in. Your job is to protect and watch over your own body. I am here to help you find the clarity and inspiration to do it.
