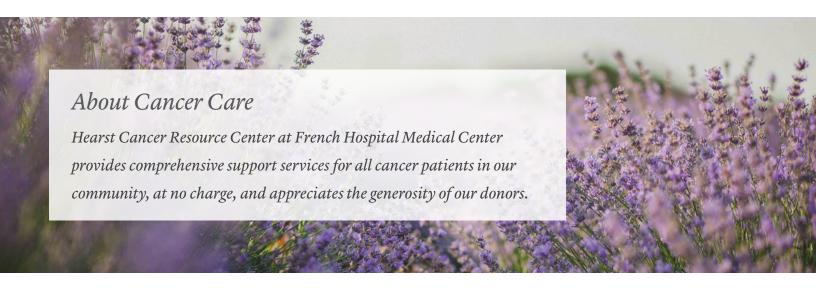

My Neighbor Emily



In 2002, we bought a new (to us) home. I had never given much thought to my neighbors or how important they are (or could be). My grandmother asked, "Hayley Jo, do you know your neighbors? Mine are my best friends." I had to admit that I didn't.

I made a point to get to know my 72 year old neighbor, Emily. I discovered she was a mother, grandmother, friend, widow, former nurse, cross-country bicyclist, pilot, quilter and one of the coolest people I knew.

Emily was the first person I tearfully told I had breast cancer (I was 36). Turns out, she fought her battle with breast cancer the year I was born (1966) when she was in her mid-30's. She gave me so much hope and strength when she said, "If I can do it, so can you. Kick cancer's butt." I believed her with all my heart. It was also exactly what I needed to hear. While I was going through treatment she brought me flowers from her garden, books from her bookshelf, knowledge from her mind and food from her kitchen. We stayed the best of friends. We proudly shared the title of breast cancer survivors.

The moral of the story is that your cancer neighbors are everywhere. You might be surprised where your main support will come from. A Chinese proverb says "to know the road ahead, ask the ones coming back." Let people who have walked down the path before you give you hope, be your strength, and lift you up.

If my neighbor Emily were sitting next to you, she would look you straight in the eye, and say, "If I can do it, so can you. Kick cancer's butt."

Check your spots—before it's too late.

According to the American Academy of Dermatology Association:



Anyone can get skin cancer, regardless of skin color. It is estimated that one in five Americans will develop skin cancer in their lifetime. When caught early, skin cancer is highly treatable.

Everyone is at risk for skin cancer. How much do you know about skin cancer?

Basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma:

- These are the most common forms of skin cancer, and are collectively referred to as non-melanoma skin cancers.
- These arise within the top layer of the skin and can appear on any sun-exposed area of the body, but are most frequently found on the face, ears, bald scalp, and neck.
- Basal cell carcinoma frequently appears as a pearly bump, whereas squamous cell carcinoma often looks like a rough, red, scaly area, or an ulcerated bump that bleeds.
- · Although non-melanoma skin cancer spreads slowly, if left untreated, it can lead to disfigurement.
- Researchers estimate that 5.4 million cases of non-melanoma skin cancer, including basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma, were diagnosed in 3.3 million people in the United States in 2012.
- · See a board-certified dermatologist if you spot anything changing, itching, or bleeding on your skin.
- When caught early and treated properly, skin cancer is highly curable.

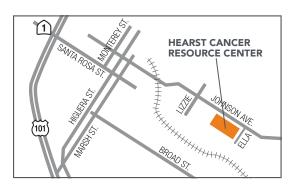
