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Let's Talk About Survivorship

No one wants to hear the words, "You have cancer." I got that phone call, at age 32, while at work. I was diagnosed with

Her2neu positive breast cancer. My first thought was "Am I going to lose my hair?" which is weird, because you would think it would be "Am I going to die?"

My doctor did not give me an option of a bilateral mastectomy, but I chose it because I was 32 years old with a huge tumor and small breasts. As my tumor was aggressive and large, I had six rounds of chemotherapy prior to surgery. I had a month of radiation and a year of Herceptin (a breast cancer specific medication). During my treatments, I met my chemo sister, who was younger than me, but we became very close as we experienced every round of chemo together. I learned of the HCRC when I joined the San Luis Young Survivor's group. I was terrified but I quickly learned that although cancer

is a club you never want to join, you will connect with the most amazing human beings. I felt so much support and most importantly I was not alone. I even took advantage of the free wigs. But I'll admit it—it was fun to karaoke to Sinéad O'Connor while bald.

I have always struggled to ask for help. However, my "chemo posse" of friends combatted my stubbornness. They cooked for me, cleaned my house while I begrudgingly let them. They celebrated all my small wins with me during my treatment. Cancer teaches you not only who you are but the value of the support you surround yourself with.

Now my mantra is, "If cancer didn't kill me, neither will this." After my journey, it led me to my husband. We struggled to have our own children and decided to go through the emotional journey of fostering to adopt. We now have our two tiny beautiful forever humans, ages 3 and 4. We were blessed to be adopted into their biological family as well. I have volunteered at HCRC to lead support groups. I believe my cancer journey was given to me in order to help others. I will continue my work as a psychologist to help others on their journey with chronic medical conditions, which includes helping my closest supporters.

Melanoma

The ABCDEs of Melanoma, What to Look for:

Melanoma is the deadliest form of skin cancer. However, when detected early, melanoma is highly treatable. You can identify the warning signs of melanoma by looking for the following:



ASYMMETRY One half unlike the other half.



BORDER
Irregular,
scalloped or
poorly defined
border.



COLOR
Varied from one area to another; shades of tan and brown, black; sometimes white, red or blue.



DIAMETER
While melanomas
are usually greater
than 6mm (the size
of a pencil eraser)
when diagnosed,
they can be smaller.
See the ruler below
for a guide.



A mole or skin lesion that looks different from the rest or is changing in size, shape or color.

PREVENT Skin Cancer: Protect Yourself From the Sun

Sun exposure is the most preventable risk factor for all skin cancers, including melanoma. You can have fun in the sun and decrease your risk of skin cancer.

HERE'S HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF FROM THE SUN:

- Seek shade when appropriate, remembering that the sun's rays are strongest between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. If your shadow is shorter than you are, seek shade.
- Wear protective clothing, such as a longsleeved shirt, pants, a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses, when possible.
- Generously apply a broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher to all exposed skin. Broadspectrum sunscreen provides protection from both ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB)rays. Reapply approximately every two hours, even on cloudy days, and after swimming or sweating.
- Use extra caution near water, snow and sand, as they reflect the damaging rays of the sun, which can increase your chance of skin cancer.
- Get vitamin D safely through a healthy diet that may include vitamin supplements. Don't seek the sun.
- Avoid tanning beds. Ultraviolet light from the sun and tanning beds can cause skin cancer and premature skin aging. If you want to look like you've been in the sun, consider using a sunless self-tanning product, but continue to use sunscreen with it.

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
