Dignity Health’s approach to community health improvement aims to address significant health needs identified in the Community Health Needs Assessments that we conduct with community input, including from the local public health department. Our initiatives to deliver community benefit include financial assistance for those unable to afford medically necessary care, a range of prevention and health improvement programs conducted by the hospital and with community partners, and investing in efforts that address social drivers of health.

Dignity Health East Valley, a member of CommonSpirit Health, comprises Chandler Regional Medical Center (CRMC) and Mercy Gilbert Medical Center (MGMC). Dignity Health East Valley shares a commitment with others to improve the health of our community and promote health equity, and delivers programs and services to help achieve that goal. The Community Benefit 2025 Report and 2026 Plan describes much of this work. We are proud of the outstanding programs, services and other community benefits our hospital delivers, and are pleased to report to our community.

In fiscal year 2025 (FY25), Mercy Gilbert Medical Center provided \$41,181,029 in patient financial assistance, unreimbursed costs of Medicaid, community health improvement services and other community benefits.

In fiscal year 2025 (FY25), Chandler Regional Medical Center provided \$66,946,039 in patient financial assistance, unreimbursed costs of Medicaid, community health improvement services and other community benefits.

The Dignity Health Arizona Market community board reviewed, approved and adopted the Community Benefit 2025 Report and 2026 Plan at its October 22, 2025 meeting.

Community Served



Dignity Health’s Mercy Gilbert and Chandler Regional Medical Centers serve Maricopa County, Arizona, home to an estimated 4.65 million residents as of 2025. The county spans 9,202 square miles, includes 24 cities and five Native American reservations, and has a median age of 37.8 years. Maricopa County’s diverse population includes approximately 1.4 million Hispanic or Latino residents and 2.6 million White residents, highlighting the need for inclusive health initiatives.

The Town of Gilbert, Arizona’s fifth-largest city, has about 279,569 residents, a median age of 36.1, and a highly educated population, with nearly half holding a bachelor’s degree or higher. Gilbert’s major employers include Northrop Grumman, Deloitte, and Mercy Gilbert Medical Center, supporting a median household income of \$121,543.

The City of Chandler, with roughly 282,048 residents and a median age of 37.4, is a hub for high-tech manufacturing, home to Intel, NXP Semiconductors, and Microchip Technology. Its population is 58.4% White, 22.6% Hispanic or Latino, and 12% Asian, reflecting the city’s economic and cultural diversity.

Together, these communities represent a dynamic, growing population, emphasizing the importance of targeted health, safety, and outreach programs to meet the region’s evolving needs.

FY25 Programs and Services



The hospital delivered several programs and services in FY25 to help address identified significant community health needs.

Mental Health: Zero Suicide Initiative, Spiritual Care mental illness, support groups and Journey of Motherhood program.

Chronic Conditions: Healthier Living Workshops, Health Eating Active Lifestyle (HEAL) and Stroke Survivor Support Group.

Cancer: Cancer Wellness classes (Chair Yoga, Tai Chi) and cancer support groups for prostate and breast cancer.

Access to Care: Building Blocks Program (Hearing and Vision screening), Immunization Clinics and Children’s Medical Clinic visits.

Violence and Injury: Medical Safe Haven, Trauma Survivors Network, and fall prevention initiatives.

Social Determinants of Health: Pathways to Wellness, Children’s Dental Clinics, Early Childhood Oral Health and Community Health Improvement Grantees.

FY26 Planned Programs and Services



For FY26, Dignity Health will focus on priority health needs and social determinants across Gilbert, Chandler, and Maricopa County through equity-driven, data-informed strategies. Leveraging CMS Health Equity Index (HEI) alongside Vital Conditions and Social Drivers frameworks, the hospital will guide programs that enhance care for vulnerable populations. Key initiatives include Community Health Improvement Grants and CommonSpirit Health Investment programs, aligned with CHNA-identified priorities.

The Connected Community Network (CCN) will expand partnerships among hospitals, clinics, and local organizations, linking individuals to resources and providing a whole-person approach to nonclinical support. Recognizing that over 80% of health outcomes are influenced by social and environmental factors, these efforts aim to reduce disparities, improve access, and strengthen community partnerships. With America’s Health Rankings projecting that 22% of the population will be 65 or older by 2035, these programs also address the growing needs of an aging population while promoting resilience and equitable health outcomes.

Our Hospital and the Community Served

About Mercy Gilbert Medical Center and Chandler Regional Medical Center

Mercy Gilbert Medical Center and Chandler Regional Medical Center are Dignity Health hospitals. Dignity Health is a member of CommonSpirit Health.

Mercy Gilbert Medical Center (MGMC) and Chandler Regional Medical Center (CRMC) are two of eight Dignity Health acute care hospitals in Arizona. Both are not-for-profit facilities with a combined medical staff of 1,776 physicians. Each Dignity Health East Valley medical center recently added a graduate medical education residency program, training approximately 28 future healthcare providers annually.

MGMC, located in Gilbert in the East Valley of the greater Phoenix area, delivers expert and compassionate care to families in the growing community and beyond. The campus is expanding with the development of the Women's and Children's Pavilion, a joint project with Phoenix Children's Hospital, which will provide high-quality, convenient care for mothers and children. As of FY2025, MGMC had 1,554 employees and 197 licensed beds.

CRMC, located in Chandler, Arizona, opened in 1961 as a small community hospital and has grown into a robust medical center, including a Level I Trauma Center and specialty services such as general surgery and cardiology. As of FY2025, CRMC had 3,105 employees and 429 licensed beds.

Financial Assistance for Medically Necessary Care

It is the policy of CommonSpirit Health to provide, without discrimination, emergency medical care and medically necessary care in CommonSpirit hospital facilities to all patients, without regard to a patient's financial ability to pay. This hospital has a financial assistance policy that describes the assistance provided to patients for whom it would be a financial hardship to fully pay the expected out-of-pocket expenses for such care, and who meet the eligibility criteria for such assistance. The financial assistance policy, a plain language summary and related materials are available in multiple languages on the hospital's website.

Description of the Community Served

Dignity Health East Valley defines the community as individuals residing within the primary service area (PSA) of Mercy Gilbert Medical Center (MGMC) and Chandler Regional Medical Center (CRMC). The PSA represents the top 75% of inpatient and outpatient discharges for both hospitals and includes a mix of urban and suburban neighborhoods across Maricopa County. This area encompasses diverse populations, including low-income and medically underserved residents.

The 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) for MGMC and CRMC focuses on Maricopa County, the fourth most populous county in the United States, spanning 9,224 square miles and home to more than 4.5 million residents. The county includes 27 cities and towns and five sovereign American Indian reservations, reflecting a rich blend of cultural and ethnic diversity.

Both MGMC and CRMC's PSAs overlap with the Gila River Indian Community (GRIC), reinforcing a commitment to serving Indigenous populations alongside suburban communities in the East Valley. CRMC's PSA includes major ZIP codes such as 85224, 85225, 85226, 85248, 85249, and 85286, while MGMC's PSA includes 85142, 85143, 85206, 85209, 85212, and 85297, among others.

Table 1.1 presents the 2025 demographic and socioeconomic profile of residents within CRMC's PSA, and Table 1.2 presents the same data for MGMC's PSA. These tables highlight variations in income, race/ethnicity, education, and insurance coverage that influence local health needs and guide community benefit priorities.

The East Valley's economy is driven by sectors such as healthcare, education, and technology, with growing employment hubs in Chandler and Gilbert. While the

region benefits from a strong healthcare infrastructure, disparities persist among low-income, older adult, and minority populations—particularly related to chronic disease, access to care, and behavioral health. These factors shape the hospitals’ community health improvement priorities and guide ongoing collaboration through Dignity Health’s Synapse Collaborative and community partnerships. 2025 Report and 2026 Plan

Creating the Community Benefit Plan

The hospital is dedicated to improving community health and delivering community benefits with the engagement of its management team, board, clinicians and staff, and in collaboration with community partners.

Hospital and health system participants included a collaborative effort led by CommonSpirit Health's Community Health Department in partnership with Dignity Health East Valley Community Health Department. Key hospital departments and partners contributed valuable expertise and insight, including Mission Integration, Center for Faith Health Partnerships, Trauma Services, Maternal Child Health, Care Coordination, Center for Transitional Care, and the Emergency Departments of Chandler Regional and Mercy Gilbert Medical Centers.

Each contributed data, community perspectives, and program input related to their areas of focus, helping identify and prioritize significant health needs. The Dignity Health Foundation East Valley also played a critical role by aligning philanthropic priorities and supporting community partnerships that address identified needs and improve the health and well-being of East Valley residents.

Community input or contributions to this community benefit plan included the Dignity Health East Valley Community Hospital Board, the Community Health Committee (CHC), and the Community Health Improvement Grants Committee, all of which include representatives from both the community and Dignity Health. Additional contributions came from community leaders, educators, and program managers from local nonprofit organizations; the Maricopa County Department of Public Health; members of the previously funded East Valley Communities of Care collaborative; current grant recipients; the East Valley Resource Coalition; and other key stakeholders across the East Valley service area.

These partners provided essential feedback, shared data and insights, and helped guide priorities to ensure that community benefit initiatives remain responsive to identified health and social needs.


The programs and initiatives described here were selected on the basis of their alignment with identified community



health priorities and their demonstrated potential for measurable impact. Selection criteria included evidence of effectiveness, capacity to address disproportionate unmet health-related needs, and emphasis on prevention—particularly through efforts that address the social determinants of health. Programs were also chosen for their ability to build community capacity, strengthen partnerships, and contribute to a seamless continuum of care across hospital and community settings.

In addition, several initiatives were intentionally designed to address **Vital Conditions**—the foundational factors that support long-term community well-being, such as lifelong learning, reliable transportation, and basic needs for health and safety. For example, the *Pathways to Wellness* program connects older adults with community resources that improve housing stability, food access, and chronic disease management.

Other initiatives focus on **Urgent Services Needs**, providing timely responses to acute challenges that threaten health and safety. For instance, Trauma Services delivers *Stop the Bleed* training and injury prevention education to enhance community preparedness and reduce preventable deaths from injury.



Community Health Core Strategies

The hospital intends that program activities to help address significant community health needs reflect a strategic use of resources. CommonSpirit Health has established three community health improvement core strategies to help ensure that program activities overall address strategic aims while meeting locally-identified needs.

- Extend the care continuum by aligning and integrating clinical and community-based interventions.
- Implement and sustain evidence-based health improvement program initiatives.
- Strengthen community capacity to achieve equitable health and well-being.
