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Breast Cancer Update:

Hypofractionation

4 Weeks Versus 6.5 Weeks of Radiation Therapy

Breast conservation surgery followed by radiation therapy (BCT) is the treatment of choice for patients who desire breast preservation.

Six randomized trials in North America and Europe comparing BCT and mastectomy confirmed these treatments are equivalent in terms of local control and overall survival. The most recent update of a European Organization for Research and Treatment of Cancer trial¹ with >20 years of follow up showed no difference between the groups in terms of time to distant metastases or overall survival.

Conventionally fractionated whole breast radiation therapy decreases the risk of ipsilateral breast cancer recurrence by 30%. This translates into 5% absolute improvement in 15 year overall survival. However, 6.5 weeks of CF-WBRT is inconvenient and costly, which can prove prohibitive for many women.

Hypofractionation Equal to or Better than Longer Treatments

Four randomized trials examining the safety and efficacy of hypofractionated whole breast radiation therapy demonstrated equivalent outcomes to conventional radiation therapy: Whelan (Canadian²); Royal Marsden (British); START A; and START B (European multi-

center)³. These trials show that daily radiation therapy length can be shortened from 6.5 weeks to 4 weeks, in selected patients.

The 10-year results of the Canadian and British fractionation trials showed that shorter (4 weeks) whole-breast fractionation schemes resulted in equal local control and complication rates.

Canadian Trial² randomized

1,234 patients to standard fractionation (50Gy in 25 fractions) vs. Hypofractionation (42.5Gy in 16 fractions)

and published their results with >12 years of follow up.

The START B trial³ (which compared 50Gy in 25 fractions to 40Gy in 15 fractions) was very similar in principle to the Canadian trial² (which compared 50Gy in 25 fractions to 42.5Gy in 16 fractions) but also included node-positive patients and those treated with mastectomy. The START trials also allowed a boost of 10Gy in 5 fractions and nodal irradiation. Both the START B and Canadian trials showed that a modestly hypofractionated regimen worked at least as well as a longer one, with equal or fewer toxicities.

Cardiac Event Risk

One of the objections to hypofractionated schemes was the concern that there might be an increased risk of late cardiac events. However, a recent study⁴ showed there was no difference in the incidence of serious cardiac morbidity up to at least 15 years for

those patients treated to the left side in relation to fractionation.

In conclusion, hypofractionated whole and partial breast radiation is a more convenient alternative to conventional radiation therapy. Data thus far suggests equivalence to standard fractionation with proper optimal patient selection. Investigations are ongoing regarding optimization of dose and fractionation to achieve optimal balance of convenience, toxicity and tumor control.



In 2006, the Leavey Cancer Center implemented the Navigator Program through a grant from the Avon Foundation for Women and began the Navigator Outreach Program with generous funding from the Harold & Carole Pump Foundation. It encompasses:

Harold & Carole Pump Foundation-Sponsored "Reaching Out" Screening Fairs – These events provide free mammograms and prostate cancer screenings for those who are uninsured or underinsured.



❖ Patient Advocate/Librarian — A part-time, bilingual Patient Advocate assists the Outreach Navigator with both outreach and inpatient needs, including assistance with transportation and home health issues. Moreover, the Patient Advocate assumes the role of Librarian, helping patients and families at the Cancer Center Library.

- Navigator Program Community Outreach
 - The goal of this program is to educate the community about cancer in general, ways to decrease risk factors and specific cancer screening guidelines. The Outreach staff also alleviates barriers to care by enrolling those who are uninsured or underinsured into the free mammogram screening program and providing assistance with obtaining health insurance. This program is also funded by the Leavey Cancer Center and the Harold & Carole Pump Foundation.
- * Community Group Outreach This program has increased cancer awareness for 7,209 individuals in 126 different community groups. Guardian Angel Church members, Vaughn School-based Clinic clients and the M.E.N.D. Community Center comprise a few of the community groups educated.

School Wellness - The Navigator Program has partnered with Northridge Hospital's School Wellness Initiative to educate parents of the program's students on screening guidelines and how to decrease cancer risk factors.

Support Groups - The Navigator Program

provides a professional liaison for the cancer support groups at the hospital, which include Breast and Trigeminal Neuralgia.

Approximately 20 patients attend per session.



- RN Navigator the patient's point-of contact concierge for any issues or questions. As a resource for each patient's unique needs during treatment, patients can rely on their Navigator whose role is to ensure a smooth transition among all hospital services by assisting with:
 - Coordination of patient appointments with other specialists.
 - Acquainting patients with all of our services including our Oncology Unit, Thomas & Dorothy Leavey Cancer Center and the Carole Pump Women's Center.
 - Pre-and-post operative surgery education.
 - Connecting patients and families with psychosocial support and groups, classes and programs.
 - Enrolling patients in the Hospital's comprehensive Patient Orientation Program, Navigating Through Your Cancer Journey.

Oncology Welcome Packages - at their

initial consult, patients receive a package designed to ease anxiety and provide comforts to common treatment side effects.



Cancer Center Staff Team Up for Massage Therapy Match Grant

Northridge Hospital is privileged to be one of only six hospitals in the nation selected by Angie's Spa

to receive funding to provide free in-hospital massages for men and women undergoing chemotherapy, radiation and surgery. These services are designed to alleviate painful side effects, provide relaxation, enhance traditional treatments and give cancer patients a self-esteem boost.

In 2013, Northridge Hospital Foundation received a continuing grant of \$35,000 to provide FREE therapeutic massage services for our in-hospital cancer patients. In addition, Angie's Spa provided a Matching Grant of up to \$3,000. A Matching Grant is a gift made with the specification that the amount donated must be matched by the organization. Motivated by this challenge, the Leavey Cancer Center Staff and patients held two bake sales to raise the matching funds. Moreover, Massage for You, the

massage company for the Leavey Cancer Center, held a oneday massage therapy event at Everest College to provide massages by donation to Northridge Hospital. These three events ensured that Northridge Hospital exceeded the challenge by raising \$3,186 for a combined



total of \$43,400. Enough to fund 1,847 patient massages.

In 2013, our Navigators scheduled massages for 1,736 individuals.

The Outreach Program's staff attended 126 community events and educated 7,209 people on cancer awareness in 2013. This education was provided in English and Spanish. Northridge Hospital and the H&CPF partnered with several community organizations to provide the vital outreach services listed below.



Oncology Conferences & Tumor Borads

Oncology Conferences are an opportunity for physicians to review and discuss treatment options available for specific malignant processes. The conferences are multidisciplinary and include physicians from Medical Oncology, Radiation Oncology, Surgery, Radiology and Pathology.

Cases presented at the Oncology Conferences are at least 10 percent of the annual analytic cases accessioned into the Cancer Registry database and include cases from the five major sites seen at Northridge Hospital Medical Center. At least 75 percent of the cases presented are required to be prospective. In 2013, 36 Tumor Boards were held

with 109 of the total 119 case presentations being prospective cases (91%).
